#### GRIT Act

#### The Issue:


- There are currently no federal funds designated for problem gambling treatment or research, unlike the billions in funding for alcohol, tobacco, and drug addiction.
- The federal government levies an excise tax of 0.25% on all money wagered on sports in the United States, which is deposited in the general fund.
- Sports betting has become a national issue, with over 35 states having legalized the activity and advertisements on most sports broadcasts.

Gambling addiction Recovery, Investment, and Treatment Act

#### GRIT Act

- This legislation would set aside 50% of the federal sports excise tax revenue for gambling addiction treatment and research.
- Importantly, this legislation does not increase taxes on Americans; it simply sets aside a funding stream for problem gambling treatment and research that will continue to increase as online sports wagering becomes more prominent.

#### Harmonization

#### Official National Problem Gambling Helpline number (NCPG)

- ► Official State Helpline Number
- ► Accepted for use in addition to statespecific number
- ► Allowed for usage in digital or national advertisements
  - Regulations\* specify "national number" is approved for use
  - Regulations\* specify "non-state" number could be used if approved
  - Regulatory memo approving use of the national number

NOTE: Some states do not require a helpline number in their ads.


