Responsible Gambling

Refers to policies, practices, and behaviors to ensure that gambling remains a safe and enjoyable activity for individuals who choose to participate.




RG is more than a philosophy

Gambling harm can have financial, social, emotional, physical, vocational, and medical impacts







Trends



Gambling Participation Rates

- About 85% of U.S. adults have gambled at least once in their lives
- 60% having gambled within the past year
- Some form of legalized gambling is available in 48 states plus the District of Columbia



Trends



Demographics

- 18 OR 21 +
- Participation varies widely, factors include age, gender, income level, and geographic location
- Younger adults and males typically report higher participation rates in gambling activities.

Prevalence of Problem Gambling



Data

- 2.5 million U.S. adults (1%) are estimated to meet the criteria for a severe gambling problem annually
- Another 5-8 million (2-3%) would be considered to have mild or moderate gambling problems

Prevalence of Problem Gambling



At-Risk Populations





Benefits of Seat Belt Usage



- Reduces risk of death
- Reduces risk of injury
- Preventing ejection
- Distributing impact force across the body
- Helping your body match vehicle speed

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, approx.

374,276

lives have been saved due to seat belt usage between through 2017

2. Strategies for Promoting Responsible Gambling

Education and Awareness Campaigns

Information Sharing:

• Clear information about the odds of winning, the rules of the games, and the potential risks associated with gambling

Public Awareness Campaigns:

• Efforts to educate the public about responsible gambling practices and the dangers of problem gambling

Education and Awareness Campaigns

Common messages:

- Promoting RG tips/tools
- Correcting misconceptions
- Informing of the risks of gambling participation
- Helpline information to access help











Primary

- Remove Risk Factor




Secondary

Positive Play Messaging

- Remember, the lottery is just for fun. <u>Play within your limits</u> and enjoy the game!
- Knowing the odds can help you play smarter!
- Take breaks to keep the fun going. Balance is key!
- The lottery's all about chance. There's no sure win, so <u>enjoy</u> the <u>unpredictability!</u>
- Dream big with small bets. Sometimes the smallest plays bring the biggest joy!
- If the fun stops, it's okay to <u>ask for help</u>. Support is available if you need it.

Best Practices



Avoid:

Misleading / Over Promising

Suggest gambling to make money

Risk Free Bet / False Promises of Winning

Stigmatizing and Negative Language

Implication of Urgency

Targeting Vulnerable Populations

Depiction of- or Appeal to Minors

Failure to disclose conditions of promotion

Encouraging chasing losses/reinvest wins

Next steps:

- Player segmentation
- Data utilization
- Targeted messaging based on play behavior
- Push notifications via online gambling
- Presence at promotional events

Responsible Gambling Tools

Assist in helping players:

- maintain healthy behaviors and relationship with gambling
- minimize gambling-related harm
- track financial losses
- enhance well-being

A robust and intentional RG program demonstrates ethical practices by operators.

Responsible Gambling Tools

Common tools:

- Budget limits
- Time limits
- Cool off periods
- Gambling activity statements
- Budget tools

Responsible Gambling Tools

Growth Considerations:

- Personalized messaging
- Check-in if gambling activity increases
- Exclusion from certain products
- Game currency in cash
- No auto-play features
- No free games prior to log-in
- Tips to prevent underage gambling
- Input on messaging from active players & individuals with lived experience

Self Exclusion Program

Self-exclusion programs empower individuals to take control of their gambling by allowing them to voluntarily ban themselves from gambling activities for a specified period.

This tool:

- helps prevent progression of problem gambling
- prevents further financial losses
- promote mental well-being by providing a necessary break and reducing access to gambling activities

Self Exclusion Program

Self-exclusion can include

- time outs/cool off period (12 hours 6 months)
- self-exclusion (6 months lifetime)

Considerations should include

- Accessibility (online and in person)
- Communication about VSE should be supportive of breaks
- Exclusion at the product level
- Incremental options for exclusion
- Auto-removal from marketing/advertisements

Self Exclusion Program

Growth Considerations:

- Upon sign-up, sending activity data to player where possible
- Connecting player to help resources
- Enforcement
- Reinstatement process requires customer initiation
- Reinstatement with a live person review RG tips/resources

Intervention and Support

<u>Identifying At-Risk Individuals</u>

Early identification of players showing signs of problem gambling will assist in intervening and providing support.

Signs to consider:

- Financial distress, increasing frequency, borrowing money, or selling possessions to fund gambling.
- Preoccupation with gambling activities, spending increasing amounts of time gambling.
- Neglecting responsibilities at work, school, or home due to gambling

Intervention and Support

<u>Identifying At-Risk Individuals</u>

Consider:

- Transaction monitoring
- Time spent gambling
- Account changes
- Behavioral indicators
- Communication records

3. Role of Professionals in PromotingResponsible Gambling

Professionals have a responsibility to alter the environment in which we are working in.

Every one of us play a role in Responsible Gambling.

Upstream impacts have downstream effects.



Public health adopts a comprehensive approach to responsible gambling, considering the social determinants of health and addressing broader issues such as poverty, social isolation, and mental health that can contribute to problem gambling.

Ensure that interventions are equitable and accessible to all population groups, particularly those most vulnerable to gambling-related harm.


Fostering an Environment


- Nonjudgmental
